(Luke 2:8-20)

I. Introduction

- A. When I was a kid, there was a huge maple tree in our backyard
 - 1. As far as I can tell, this maple tree was only good for three things
 - a. Good for climbing... and falling out of and breaking your arm
 - b. Good for getting those whirly-bird, helicopter seeds everywhere
 - c. Good for spreading surface roots out into places like sewer lines.
 - 2. Our bathtub would fill-up with stuff bathtubs ought not fill up with
 - a. Roto-Rooter guy came, did smelly job, and things back to normal
 - b. I remember thinking, "That's not job that I want when I grow up"
 - c. I also remember being very grateful he was there to do dirty job
 - 3. We continue with our series "Outcasts." We come to the shepherds
- B. Jews looked at shepherds a lot like I looked at the guy from Roto-Rooter
 - 1. Sheep were very important to Jews for several different reasons
 - a. Sheep were eaten for food, though they probably ate more goat (*They also had beef, but sheep and goats did better on the semi-arid land*)
 - b. They needed sheep for wool which made up a lot of their cloth
 - c. As Passover neared, they really needed a lot of sheep for sacrifice
 - 1) Josephus says that 256,000 sheep were sacrificed in one year
 - 2) The sheep industry was a booming business in was Israel
 - 2. The Jews needed sheep, but they really had little use for shepherds!
 - a. That longstanding prejudice that goes back to Joseph and Egypt
 - 1) Remember where the Jews settled in Egypt? Land of Goshen.
 - 2) Settled there because Egypt didn't like shepherds (Gen 46:33)
 - b. People like wool and mutton, but nobody seems to like shepherds
 - 1) Shepherds were dirty, smelly gypsies who moved with sheep
 - 2) They weren't just drifters but also grifters—had sticky-fingers
 - 3) They were so unreliable they couldn't testify in Jewish court
 - 4) They weren't just uncouth and unclean—they were also unholy
 - 3. Everyone needs sheep; no one likes shepherds. Outsiders. Outcasts.

II. The Shepherds All Were Watching

- A. First century Israel was occupied territory owned-and-operated by Rome
 - 1. The Jews had always looked to time when God would send His Messiah
 - a. But Roman occupation had created a "Messianic expectation"
 - b. In the first century, the Jews really leaned into Messianic promise
 - 1) Gamaliel points to several failed Messianic movements (Acts 5)
 - 2) Jesus warns followers that false Messiahs would arise (Matt 24:5)
 - c. There was this heightened awareness that time Messiah was near
 - 2. Maybe not so much for the shepherds; they were just caring of sheep
 - a. Outcasts usually aren't that invested in political or societal events
 - 1) Guy living off-the-grid in Wyoming cabin isn't follow primary
 - 2) Homeless living under bridge likely didn't follow impeachment
 - b. Shepherds didn't worry about Rome; too busy taking care of sheep
 - c. They were hard men doing a hard job, often a very thankless job
- B. It is bit ironic they were the ones to first hear of Messiah (<u>Luke 2:8-12</u>)
 - 1. We've heard this story so many times that it sounds almost normal
 - a. Of course, there is nothing normal about it... except their reaction!
 - 1) Unlike Mary, the shepherds have the decency to be terrified
 - 2) So the first message of the angel is for them not to be afraid
 - b. The real message is, "I bring you good news of great joy" Gospel!
 - 1) There is an awful lot to take in there, but there is no time.
 - 2) Before they have a chance, the heaven open (<u>Luke 2:13-14</u>)
 - 2. What do these hard men going do? What they were told (Lk 2:15-16)
 - a. They angels told them they would fins a baby in a manger-they go
 - b. We're not told exactly HOW they found the right manger- they do
 - c. Also not told how pleased Mary/Joseph are when they just show up
 - 1) Years ago, Lynn was in hospital for 11 days after burst appendix
 - 2) Had plenty of visitors; Lynn had this look, "Get rid of them now"
 - 3) Did Mary have a look for the shepherds? (Little Drummer boy?)
 - 3. Shepherds start the story as outcasts; end as first witness of Messiah

III. Conclusion

- A. This story reminds us that the gospel of Jesus is a story for nobodies
 - 1. God announced the coming of His Messiah to outcast shepherds
 - a. High Priest slept through all this ruckus and did all the Pharisees
 - b. Peter, Andrew, James and John were around there somewhere too
 - 2. God could have announced the Messiah's birth to all kinds of people
 - a. Good news of great joy was shared Good with a bunch of nobodies
 - b. Those nobodies then shared message with everybody (2:17-18, 20)
 - c. Maybe God made a pretty good choice after all, don't you think?
 - 1) Story begins with "the shepherds all were watching..."
 - 2) But it ends "Go tell it on the mountain Jesus Christ is born"
- B. We live today in the most divided and divisive times that I can remember
 - 1. Except for during the civil rights movement (but I was pretty young)
 - a. And anti-war protests during Vietnam (lot of good music music)
 - b. There was Nixon and Watergate. OK, we've always been divided
 - c. What is different is there's ZERO respect and tolerance for others
 - 1) Anyone with different view is dismissed as snowflake or losers
 - 2) New term "rankism." When you demean one of lower rank (Like when the loser valet makes is too slow fetching your Lamborghini...)
 - 2. Gospel is God's good news for nobodies... and we're all nobodies
 - a. Christ's Kingdom begins with the truth that all are one (Gal 3:28)
 - b. If you want to be first, then you must make yourself last (Mk 9:35)
 - c. If you want to be great, you must be servant/slave of all (Mt 20:26)
 - d. Call to follow is filled with things that sound like losing (Mt 5:5,39)
 - e. Being perfect follower sounds like being perfect loser (Mt 5:43-44)
 - f. Ways to being forgiven by God is through forgiving other (Col 3:13)
- C. Maybe that's why the gospel story starts with a bunch of shepherds
 - 1. They're the first to get to hear it; they're first who get to share it
 - 2. It started with a bunch of losers with nothing to offer but themselves
 - 3. And so it is with us today. All we can give God is our faithfulness.
