(Luke 19:39-40)

## I. Introduction

- A. When I was a kid, we didn't really make that big of a deal of Easter
  - 1. Our church taught that every Sunday was Resurrection Sunday
    - a. We didn't do anything special on Easter (were more people there)
    - b. We did get Easter baskets; we'd never have brought them to church
      - 1) I got to eat one piece of candy before church (very stressful)
      - 2) And I get a new suit to wear to church on Easter Sunday
      - 3) Same suit I'd wear every Sunday until next Easter. Special?
  - 2. And we would have never expected a resurrection sermon on Easter
    - a. Professor: Preach resurrection at Christmas and birth at Easter
    - b. So let's all stand and sing a couple of verses of "Silent Night"
  - 3. Might we miss something not following the liturgical church calendar?
    - a. Might having a special theological focus help us to... well focus
    - b. Does NOT having special Sundays make all Sundays special?
    - c. Or does it make none of them very special? The jury may be out.
- B. Today is Palm Sunday on the church, but we aren't doing anything special
  - 1. Palm Sunday points to Triumphant Entry of Jesus (all four of gospels)
    - a. It is a "movable feast" because it's date changes along with Easter
    - b. This is the first day of Passion Week (passio; Latin for "suffering")
  - 2. It's called "Palm Sunday" for the palm branches laid before Jesus
    - a. Some churches go all out today and buy palm branches to wave
      - 1) I thought about having you have cash as we read that part of story
      - 2) That would have been a great time to pass the collection baskets
    - b. Other churches rent a donkey for someone to ride down aisle (Roger said we couldn't do that because he knew who'd be cleaning up)
      - 1) All of this is to emphasize a powerful and important gospel story
      - 2) It's story we don't stress enough; we don't have special Sundays
  - 3. We will focus on it today; first let's read it (Reading: Matt 21:6-11)

## II. Let the Rocks Be Kept Silent

- A. Some people just know how to make a dramatic entrance, right?
  - 1. It all begins in a dramatic moment we likely run right by (Luke 9:21)
    - a. Literally, it says that Jesus "set his face to go to Jerusalem" (ESV)
    - b. We might say that he, "Set his jaw" or he "gritted his teeth"
      - 1) You know that determined look when dash for the car in rain?
      - 2) All else that happens from this point is on the road to Jerusalem
  - 2. And when Jesus finally gets there, everyone shouts his name. Not bad!
    - a. Scene here taken right out of the coronation of Jehu (2 Kings 9:13)
    - b. As we saw, the use of the palm branches was connected to worship
  - 3. And they shouted what we've been singing all morning—"Hosanna!"
    - a. "Hosanna" is the Greek form of the Hebrew word meaning "Save!"
    - b. It's asking to be saved and thanks for being saved (Psa 118:25-27)
- B. What would it have been like in crowd shouting "Hosannas" to Jesus?
  - 1. Would that have been exciting? What would we have done?
    - a. Would we approach it differently than our praise and worship?
    - b. But this is different! Jesus is right there, riding in on a donkey?
    - c. Isn't Jesus is right here with us today? Should we get a donkey?
  - 2. What do we do if someone gets carried away in worship?
    - a. We have no idea, right? That has simply never happened here (Ushers run over and shush him, "Sir, you just need to settle down...")
    - b. Never happened. Oh, we do have a few folks who raise hands
    - c. Ans occasionally, some people do have to fight back a few tears
      - 1) Why fight them back? We're afraid to let ourselves go, right
      - 2) Alexander Campbell one cried out, "Hallelujah!" Was mortified!
  - 3. Why? Because people get uncomfortable when others get carried away
    - a. That happened the first Palm Sunday... with kids! (Matt 21:15-16)
      - 1) You know grumpy old man who yells at kids, "Get off my lawn"
      - 2) That's the Jewish leaders; can't have kids getting carried away
    - b. Maybe that is exactly what we need; people taking praise seriously

- C. Luke has a different take on the grumpy old men theme (Luke 19:37-39)
  - 1. Pharisees are offended when the disciples get carried away in worship
    - a. You, it's way too easy to offend Pharisees when you worship
      - 1) Sing too many songs, or too few songs, or sing the wrong songs
      - 2) Change the order of service or quote the wrong guy in sermon
      - 3) Bruce Jackson told of a guy put off by a song after closing prayer
    - b. The disciples were too carried away in praise... in praise of Jesus
    - c. Pharisees demand Jesus make his disciples stop all the commotion
  - 2. Jesus responds, "If they don't worship, the rocks will" (Luke 19:40)
    - a. It wasn't that everyone understood WHY they were worshipping
      - 1) Remember, Matthew said that some in the crowd were clueless
      - 2) John says some of the clueless ones were apostles! (John 12:16)
    - b. It wasn't that they understood all of the ramifications of Palm Sunday
      - 1) Remember, he set his face and gritted his teeth to get to this point
      - 2) The king had come to Jerusalem! There HAD to be worship!
    - c. If the people didn't worship him, the rocks would cry out his name!
- D. Will we let the rocks cry out? Or will we do what we were created for?
  - 1. Why did God choose us? What is His purpose? *Praise of His glory!* 
    - a. Am I saying that our whole purpose in life is to praise His glory?
    - b. I'm not saying that; I'm saying that Paul said that (Eph 1:11-14)
    - c. If we don't praise in our worship and in our life—stones will cry out
  - 2. Wayne Watson wrote an old song that riffs on this theme (*Almighty*)
    - a. In the song, we as worshippers accept our responsibility to praise
    - b. We give voice to what all creation declares—let the rocks be silent The beasts of the field, the birds of the air are silent to call out your name The earth has no voice and I have no choice but to magnify God unashamed Let the rocks be kept silent for one more day; *Let the whole world sing out, let the people say* Almighty, most holy God; Faithful through the ages!

Almighty, most holy Lord, Glorious, almighty God

- c. Will we let the rocks be silent? Will we magnify God unashamed?
- 3. What starts in our worship must continue in our lives (song video)

## **III. Conclusion**

- A. Why were the Pharisees so alarmed & intimidated by cries of Hosanna?
  - 1. Where were priests such grumpy old men on that first Palm Sunday?
    - a. It wasn't that they weren't anticipating the coming of the Messiah
    - b. Messianic expectation was high—why the crowds were so eager
  - 2. It was right celebration, much like one given Judas Maccabeus in 165
    - a. Was wrong king! "This isn't the king you're looking for" (Star Wars)
    - b. Real kings come in pomp and power; they come on war horses
      - 1) This king was meek and gentle and came riding on a donkey!
      - 2) OK, that's exactly what the prophets predicted (Matt 21:4-5)
    - c. But Israel was occupied territory, ruled and runover by the Romans
      - 1) They wanted a mighty warrior king to lead them to freedom
      - 2) And in a few days, shouts of "Hosanna" became "Crucify him!"
  - 3. Jesus wasn't the king they were looking for... and so they killed him
- B. What is the point? To better "magnify God unashamed?" Good start!
  - 1. Maybe a better point is that we need to make sure why we worship
    - a. If Jesus is really our Lord and King, then he gets to set the agenda
    - b. People in story had their own agenda; wanted a certain kind of king
      - 1) In John 6:15, a crowd (mod) rallied to make Jesus king by force
      - 2) But then he started teaching hard things, requiring hard things
      - 3) By <u>verse 66</u>, they left; he wasn't the king they were looking for
  - 2. If Jesus is king, we must worship and serve Him based on HIS agenda
    - a. Jesus does not promise to make us rich and successful (Luke 18:22)
    - b. He doesn't promise to solve problems or resolve issues (John 16:66)
    - c. He doesn't promise to make our family life perfect (Matt 10:34-36)
    - d. He doesn't promise to heal us and save us from death (John 11:14)
    - e. And he never promised to make America great again (John 18:26)
  - 3. If those are your agenda, then Jesus isn't the king you are looking for!
    - a. Jesus agenda is to get you to God; he came to seek and save the lost
    - b. To really shout your "Hosanna," you must accept him on His terms
