High and Exalted (3): In the Year that King Uzziah Died

(Isaiah 6)

I. Introduction

- A. There for a while, I thought that I was pretty much bad luck omen
 - 1. For 3-out-of-4 years, we had to evacuate Nags Head due to hurricanes
 - a. We'd schedule vacation; plywood, water, batteries would sell out
 - b. Nags Head Chamber of Commerce offered us free tickets to Disney
 - 2. I have another claim to shame that involves the deaths of celebrities
 - a. I applied to FHC in 1974, in the year that Buford Pusser died (1974)
 - 1) Pusser was the sheriff in "Walking Tall," much of it filmed at FHC
 - 2) Lynn and I were in a scene in the sequel (well, our shoes were)
 - b. Then I applied to grad school in Memphis in 1977, the year Elvis died
 - 1) Factoid: Churches of Christ are usually named after their street
 - 2) Not the Southaven church in Memphis... on Elvis Pressley Blvd
 - c. The reason I didn't go on for a PhD; I didn't want to kill anyone else
- B. We continue today with our study of the book of Isaiah, "High and Exalted"
 - 1. And today we come to the text that the title of series comes from
 - a. It is the text where Isaiah receives his commission as a prophet
 - b. This stands as one of the most dramatic scenes in the book
 - 2. Before we let Isaiah testify, let set up a part of the story we skipped
 - a. Isaiah has 66 chapters, so we'll be skipping quite a few of them
 - b. Isaiah 5 pronounces a series of woes on the land of Judah
 - 1) There is greed where the rich take and take and take (<u>5:8</u>)
 - 2) There was an endless party where it's always Miller Time (5:11)
 - 3) Right and wrong were jumbled; people ran after wrong (<u>5:20</u>)
 - 4) Judah had all the answers; they certainly didn't hear God (5:21)
 - 3. This was a time of unparalleled prosperity and power for Judah
 - a. The king that reigns over Judah as Isaiah begins was King Uzziah (1:1)
 - b. Our text begins with the statement, "In the year that king Uzziah died"
 - c. Let's start by reading the first part of Isaiah 6 (**Reading: Isaiah 6:1-4**)

II. The Temple Vision of Isaiah

- A. Isaiah sees God high and exalted; he doesn't describe God (only his robe)
 - 1. He does go into detail describing the Seraphim that are worshipping God
 - a. This is the only time Seraphim is used; cherubim is used 75 times
 - 1) Seraphim & cherubim have wings; so do 4 living creatures in Rev 4
 - 2) As far as I can tell, angels are never described as having wings
 - b. Seraphim uses their wings to fly and cover their faces and their feet
 - 1) In the ancient world, you didn't show kings your face or feet
 - 2) You entered bowing low and you exited backwards, bowing low
 - 2. There is a technical word for bowing low like that. It's called worship
 - a. That's exactly what the seraphim are doing, crying "Holy, holy, holy"
 - b. This echoes the worship of God's people all through scripture
 - 1) This was the Song of Moses after the Red Sea (**Exo 15:11-13**)
 - 2) It is the Song of Moses and the Lamb in heaven (Rev 15:2-4)
 - c. Isaiah says that the worship of the Seraphim shook the Temple
- B. They only had a quartet! Why don't we shake this place in our worship?
 - 1. No, I'm not suggested that Isaiah 6 is meant as a pattern for worship (God has some pretty special special-effects in Isaiah 6; all we have is PowerPoint)
 - 2. Sometimes we miss the point of worship by focusing on our expereince
 - a. What do these statements said about worship have in common?

 I could really feel the Holy Spirit moving in our worship today

 God was really there today in our worship; I was moved by His presence

 I can feel the brush of angles wings...surely the presence of the Lord is in this place
 - b. What does those have in common... besides you don't hear it here?
 - c. It is focusing on what I experience, what I feel, what I get out of it
 - 3. The focus of the Seraphim was God! How could that be half-hearted?
 - a. Maybe our worship is often half-hearted is because we focus on us
 - b. What we like. What either floats our boat or offends our sensibilities
 - c. If we are really focusing on God, then we will not see ourselves
 - 1) We praise God for truth (not be offended that Newsboys had music)
 - 2) We'll lift our hears to God; not care that some did/didn't lift hands

III. In the Year King Uzziah Died

- A. Let's go back to how text begins, "In the year that King Uzziah died"
 - 1. That would have been in 740 BC, but is this just date/time stamp?
 - a. Remember, Isaiah is a collection of prophetic oracles or sermons
 - b. They are not in chronological order. So why begin with the date?
 - 2. The point is not the date, but rather the fact that King Uzziah died
 - a. Uzziah was most powerful and prosperous of all the kings of Judah
 - 1) He raised and equipped a large, powerful army (2 Chron 26:11ff)
 - 2) He built great war machines for his archers (2 Chron 26:15a)
 - 3) He defeated the Philistines and exacted tribute from Ammonites
 - b. The fame of King Uzziah spread all the way to Egypt (2 Chron 26:8b)
 - 3. So the death of the great King Uzziah was devastating to all of Judah
 - a. That's why Isaiah tells us his vision was "in the year King Uzziah died"
 - b. Before he could be a prophet, Isaiah had to see who was really King
- B. Judah could see Uzziah's throne more clearly than they could see God's
 - 1. And we make the same mistake! We world falls apart and we panic!
 - a. If Isaiah wrote today, he would begin "In year of the great recession..."
 - b. Or maybe it would begin, "In the year the Twin Towers fell..."
 - c. Or maybe the vision would begin "In the year of the great election..."
 - d. Or more personally, "In the year I got cancer" or "the year I lost my job"
 - 2. We need to remember who really is on the throne of the universe!
 - a. We need to look up into the night sky and remember the glory of God
 - b. We need to know He is king, no matter what pretender rule on earth
 - c. We need to know that He reigns over the ups and downs of our lives
 - 1) When life is good, God reigns; when life falls apart, God reigns
 - 2) When the foundations of our world are shaken, God reigns
 - 3) In the good times and bad times and in-between times, God reigns
 - 4) When darkness is so thick there seem no room for light, God reigns
 - 5) Over our life and our death and over worlds to come, God reigns
 - 3. When we see the glory of God, then we will see ourselves differently

IV. What If We Truly Saw the Lord?

- A. First, we wouldn't take ourselves so seriously or sin so cavalierly (Isa 6:5)
 - 1. Isaiah's first response to seeing God's holiness was to go to his knees
 - a. The holiness of God caused him to see his own unholiness
 - b. Did he take his sin seriously? He thought he was a dead man!
 - 2. Do we really see the holiness of God as we come to church?
 - a. If we did, would we go away complaining about the service?
 - b. If we did, would we leave here unconcerned about sinful lives?
 - 3. We're standing on holy ground and God calls us to be holy
- B. **Second**, if we truly saw God's holiness, we' be driven to serve him (Isa 6:8)
 - 1. God has a task that must be done, "Who will I send? Who will go for us?"
 - a. Who will go for us? Is this a clue to God's triune nature? Interesting
 - b. But Isaiah doesn't sit around doing theology; he volunteers to work
 - 2. What if Bailey gets up later and asks for last minute VBS volunteers?
 - a. Everyone starts looking at their shoes or their phones. Crickets!
 - b. That's Biblical, right? Moses made excuses ("I can't speak well...)
 - 1) Gideon was from too obscure family; Jeremiah was too young
 - 2) Queen Esther was too worried about proper palace protocol
 - 3. Isaiah wasn't like that at all; he jumps at the chance to be used by God
 - a. Why? He knew that glory and majesty of God and wanted others to
 - b. Maybe that's why we're so timid and reticent to take on God's work
 - c. Maybe we just don't really realize what a mighty God we serve
- C. **Third**, Isaiah had just been sanctified and forgiven of His sin (Isaiah 6:6-7)
 - 1. Isaiah's unclean lips had been made clean-- so he was sanctified
 - a. Do we realize the debt of sin that Jesus took off of us at cross?
 - b. Has it become an ordinary, ho-hum idea that we have been saved?
 - 2. If we really know that God has rescued us, we will want others rescued
 - 3. Are you ready to be ready to be rescued? Are you ready to repent today?
 - a. Line in song, "Touch my lips with holy fire and make me more like you"
 - b. Isaiah experience being purified and made clean is our invitation
